Ms. Schafrik briefly explained the budget adoption process. She noted that a public hearing was held on April 22, and no changes were requested by the Board. She said that the State Code requires a seven-day separation between the public hearing and budget adoption. The budget was advertised with revenue estimates, expenditure estimates for various funds, and a breakdown of the general fund by departments. She presented a resolution for the Board to adopt the fiscal year 2025-2026 budget.

AMERICANS' MONTH

Mr. Catalano read a resolution declaring May as Older Americans Month. The resolution emphasized recognizing and honoring older adults for their life experience, wisdom, and contributions to society. It highlighted how older Americans improve communities through intergenerational relationships, community service, and civic engagement. The resolution urged residents to "flip the script on aging" and celebrate older adults' profound impact on the local community. The theme focused on empowering older adults through social connections, health resources, and support.

RE: MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

Mr. James Henshaw requested assistance in helping emergency services locate his farm property more easily. Specifically, he suggested installing a mailbox and signage to help identify the location, noting that the property has three buildings and a silo at the end of Cool Springs Lane. Mr. Henshaw shared that he has worked in multiple counties and observed that some farmers have mailboxes on properties without residential units to aid in identification and communication. He wants the county to explore ways to help emergency services and others find and access such properties more efficiently. The Board briefly discussed his request and agreed that they would look into his request.

Dr. Patterson, a kindergarten teacher, addressed the lack of diversity in Greene County's educational staff. She highlighted that she is one of only 2.4% black educators in the school division, compared to neighboring counties like Albemarle. Despite her strong performance and multiple award nominations, she described experiencing marginalization through unequal treatment, dismissed concerns, and lack of structural support. She called on the Board of Supervisors to advocate for more inclusive hiring practices, prioritize equity in education funding, and ensure that educational infrastructure reflects the needs of all students and families. She emphasized the importance of representation and creating a sense of belonging for all students.

RE: PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED SECONDARY SIX YEAR PLAN FOR FY26-31 AND ON THE SECONDARY SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION BUDGET FOR FY26

Ms. Shephard, VDOT Resident Engineer, presented the Secondary Six Year Plan, highlighting two primary road priorities. Mission Home Road is first, with \$208,000 allocated in July and an additional \$61,000 the following year. Middle River Road is the second priority, receiving funding in 2026, 2027, and 2028. The plan leaves the outer years (2029-2031) with unallocated grant funds. She noted that the road projects are part of the standard planning process for road improvements and maintenance in the county.

The public hearing was opened and closed with no speakers.

RE: VDOT QUARTERLY UPDATE

In her VDOT quarterly update, Ms. Shephard reported minimal ongoing road projects. She discussed the Route 636 Goose Pond Road bridge replacement, with design approval expected

in December 2027. Regarding the new surface on Route 33, she explained it was a latex application used to preserve road surfaces, which can initially be noisy but settles over time. She addressed concerns about road maintenance, dead animal removal, and potential improvements to Turkey Ridge Road. Ms. Shepherd said that Orange County has no desire to add Wilhoits Mill Road to their plan. Mr. Catalano echoed that sentiment from the Chair of the Orange County Board. Ms. Shepherd also mentioned the upcoming relocation of the VDOT area headquarters, assuring that snow removal capabilities on the mountain would be maintained by staging materials and trucks strategically.

Mr. Pat Willenborg, a resident of Beasley Road for 27 years, requested the Board of Supervisors review safety conditions on the road. He has requested six times, either in writing or in person, for three specific changes: lowering speed limits, installing traffic calming signage, and adding no through commercial truck traffic signs. He noted that Beasley Road has become a high-speed commercial shortcut, with a dramatic increase in speeding. Mr. Willenborg pointed out that other nearby roads like Route 33 Business, Route 230, and Durrett Ridge Road have already implemented such safety measures. He suggested that with appropriate signage, the sheriff's department would have something to enforce, improving road safety.

Sheriff Smith asked the VDOT look into the addition of a turn lane off of Route 33 into the schools to help with the dangerous situation created by the stopped traffic during pick up and drop off times.

The Board thanked Ms. Shepherd for her update.

RE: RESOLUTION OF INTENT TO CHANGE DEFINITIONS IN THE ZONING ORDINANCE REGARDING INDOOR RECREATION

Mr. Frydl discussed updating the definition of indoor recreation in the Zoning Ordinance, which has remained unchanged since 2003. He noted that the current definition reflects outdated attitudes and treats fitness centers differently from other retail activities. Mr. Frydl suggested removing items with similar impacts to other retail activities while keeping provisions for larger facilities like skating parks that might have greater community impacts. He requested permission from the Board to begin the process of revising the definition with the Planning Commission, aiming to create a more current and practical zoning classification for indoor recreational spaces.

RE: ADMINISTRATION OF STATE FUNDED BONUSES

Ms. Schafrik discussed the state-funded 1.5% bonus for Compensation Board positions. She presented three options: 1) Give all county employees a 1.5% bonus (which would require additional funding), 2) Give bonuses to all employees in departments with constitutional officers (requiring about \$38,000 additional), or 3) Give bonuses only to constitutional officers (requiring no additional county funding). She emphasized the potential workplace disruption if only some employees receive a bonus, especially since some staff work side by side with different funding sources. Ms. Schafrik suggested using one-time funding sources like unreserved general fund balance, carryover funds, contingency funds, or delaying new hires to cover the cost. Her goal was to start a discussion and get Board direction on handling the bonus.

Mr. McGuigan said that in all fairness, the bonus should be across the board and said he prefers the option of delaying new hires.

Ms. Durrer said that she feels the bonus should be given to all employees and she feels that the money could come from the different sources Ms. Schafrik mentioned.

Mr. Catalano said that he disagrees and that only those in constitutional offices should receive the bonus. Mr. Goolsby agreed and said that they had just approved a 3% raise.

Ms. Schafrik said that she would work on the details and bring options back at an upcoming meeting.

RE: BOARD LIAISON REPORTS

Mr. Goolsby attended the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission two weeks prior.

RE: COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

Ms. Schafrik shared that the Bear Festival is coming up on June 7th.

RE: OTHER ITEMS FROM THE BOARD

Mr. McGuigan raised concerns about a potential conflict of interest with Mr. White developing the water plan, questioning whether he would be directing work to himself. Ms. Schafrik clarified that there is no conflict because Mr. White is working on behalf of the County, would bid the work out to a contractor, and would oversee the project just as he would if he were staff. She emphasized that whether he's working on the White Run reservoir or other county projects, he is always working in the County's best interest. Ms. Schafrik noted that Mr. White is a contractor, not a staff member, and would manage the project professionally.

Mr. Catalano clarified his position on the Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) program after being misquoted on the Greene Sentinel Facebook page. He emphasized that he is neither for nor against the PDR but wants to conduct proper due diligence before appropriating funds. Specifically, he wants to review multiple sample ordinances and investigate the potential impact on voluntary conservation easements. Mr. Catalano stressed that he wants to understand the details and potential unintended consequences before making a decision. Mr. McGuigan argued that the Board had previously agreed to use residual funds for PDR, but Mr. Catalano maintained his stance of wanting more information before committing to the program.

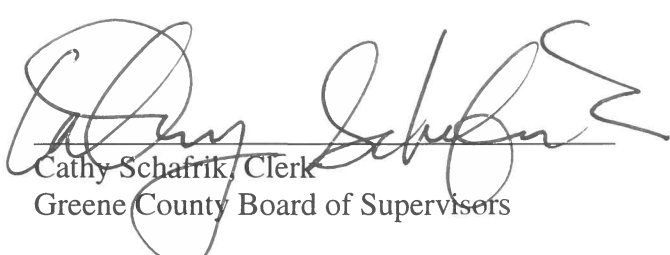

WHEREAS, at the public hearing on April 22, 2025, all those who wished to speak for or against the proposed budget were heard.

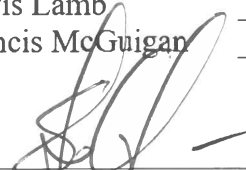

WHEREAS, May is Older Americans Month, a time for us to recognize and honor older adults in Greene County, and their immense influence on every facet of American society; and

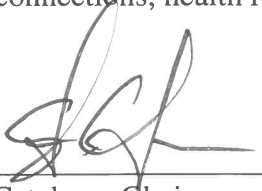

WHEREAS, Greene County benefits when people of all ages, abilities, and backgrounds have the opportunity to participate and live independently; and

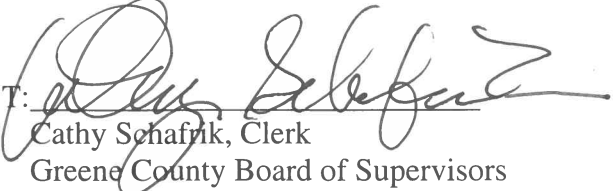
WHEREAS, Greene County must ensure that older Americans have the resources and support needed to stay involved in their communities, reflecting our commitment to inclusivity, connectedness; and

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Section 33.2-331 of the 1950 Code of Virginia, as amended, provides the opportunity for each County to work with the Virginia Department of Transportation in developing a Secondary Six Year Road Plan; and

ORDINANCE**

WHEREAS, the Greene County Zoning Ordinance may occasionally be amended, supplemented, changed, modified, or repealed by the governing body pursuant to Section 15.2-2285 of the Code of Virginia.

WHEREAS, this resolution is to amend various sections of the text of the Zoning Ordinance, which are listed below, for purposes of correction, modification, and elaboration of general regulations. Amendments are proposed for clarification of intent, the addition of definitions, and the correction of inconsistencies.

- Health and Fitness Centers and similar uses (Articles PUD, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12)
- Definitions (Article 22)

WHEREAS, the BOARD OF SUPERVISORS has determined that a review of these Articles to ensure compliance with the Code of Virginia and to promote harmony with surrounding properties is beneficial to the health, safety and welfare of county residents; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT for purposes of public necessity, convenience, general welfare, and good Zoning practices, the BOARD OF SUPERVISORS hereby adopts a resolution of intent to amend the appropriate sections of the Greene County Zoning Ordinance to achieve the purposes described herein; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Planning Commission shall hold a public hearing on the zoning text amendment proposed by this resolution of intent, and make its recommendation to the Board of Supervisors, at the earliest possible date.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Board of Supervisors (1) finds that these amendments are in furtherance of the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, and good zoning practice, (2) directs staff to prepare draft amendments for consideration, and (3) directs that the proposed amendments on these matters be brought forward for notice, hearing, Planning Commission recommendation, and Board of Supervisors' action.

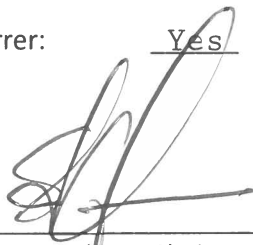
