RE: STATEMENT REGARDING RUCKERSVILLE VOLUNTEER FIRE

Ms. Kemp read the following statement from the Board of Supervisors:

The Board of Supervisors' highest concern is for the safety of the public. However, the Virginia code limits the board's authority when it comes to volunteer fire stations, the board has taken reasonable steps to protect the safety of the public. The board has engaged a neutral third-party group to review recent events that cause concern for public safety and the safety of firefighters. The process for the independent review is underway and expected to wrap up shortly with a written report that has recommendation and action items. The board is eager to receive this report and will work with all three volunteer fire companies to implement the recommendations for the benefit of the public and fire companies.

RE: MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

Ms. Nancy Rodriguez spoke about supporting the restroom facilities project at the pavilion. As a relatively new community member since 2020, she highlighted the importance of the farmers market and explained that restroom facilities would benefit both vendors and potential community events like craft markets. She requested the board release funds from tourism carryover to build these restroom facilities, noting it would make the space more convenient and usable for vendors and the public.

Mr. Scott Mingledorff spoke about proposed changes to the agritourism ordinance. He referenced an old adage "good fences make good neighbors" to emphasize the need for clear boundaries in rural communities. Citing a 10-year-old Fauquier County ordinance, he argued that defining limits on agritourism activities can prevent misunderstandings and conflicts. He expressed concern about preserving Greene County's rural character and suggested that without well-managed boundaries, the county could reach a tipping point where its rural essence is lost. Mr. Mingledorff proposed a new ordinance and invited the board to review their proposal and meet to discuss it further.

Mr. Bill Martin spoke in support of the Greene Commons restroom proposal. He highlighted the ongoing Standardsville revitalization efforts, noting that the town, county, and private citizens have incrementally transformed the area over the past 15 years, largely through grant funding and community sweat equity. Mr. Martin characterized the restroom project as a modest but important infrastructure initiative. He encouraged the board to support the proposal, believing that Greene Commons has thoroughly prepared their request and that the project aligns with the community's ongoing development efforts.

Ms. Anna Brown spoke in support of the Greene Commons restroom facilities project. As a volunteer involved with various Greene County tourism events like the Bear Festival and Clay Festival, and who runs a charity bike event benefiting Feeding Greene, she emphasized the need

for proper bathroom facilities. She argued that the current single stall and porta-potties are inadequate, especially for families with small children. Ms. Brown stressed that the proposal is reasonable, using tourism dollars that are not from the general fund, and would open up new opportunities without fundamentally changing the character of the town. She urged the board to approve the project.

Ms. CJ Jordan spoke virtually about an incident involving her representation at the General Assembly. She strongly objected to a board member's characterization of her as misrepresenting herself while advocating for Greene County's \$3 million water infrastructure submission. Ms. Jordan emphasized that she was there as part of the Greene County Gatekeepers, a private citizen group, and did not claim to represent the county officially. She presented an email from Francis McGuigan thanking Keith Bourne for his advocacy efforts, which she used to support her claim of proper representation. Ms. Jordan demanded accountability for what she perceived as false statements about her role and conduct and asked for a reprimand of the board member who she believed mischaracterized her actions.

RE: PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER AMENDING ARTICLE 22 DEFINITIONS TO REVISE THE DEFINITION OF INDOOR RECREATION AND TO ADD A NEW DEFINITION FOR HEALTH AND FITNESS CENTERS

Mr. Jim Frydl presented a staff report about updating the zoning ordinance's definitions for indoor recreation and health and fitness centers. He explained that currently, health and fitness centers require a special use permit, which is unnecessary given their similar impact to other retail businesses. The proposed change would update the definition of indoor recreation, create a new definition for health and fitness centers, make health and fitness centers a by-right use in business districts (B1, B2, B3, PUD, TFRD, and industrial districts) and remove the requirement for a special use permit for gyms/fitness centers. Mr. Frydl said that the planning commission voted 5-0 to recommend this change. Mr. Frydl noted the update would make it easier for businesses like Anytime Fitness to establish locations without going through a complex special use permit process.

The public hearing was opened and closed with no speakers.

The Board agreed that this was more of a housekeeping issue and that the changes needed to be made.

RE: PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER A REQUEST FOR A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FROM DASIA TOMPKINS FOR A CHILDCARE CENTER LOCATED AT 919 MORNING GLORY TURN

Mr. Frydl provided a staff report regarding the special use permit request by Daisia Tompkins for an in-home childcare center. Mr. Frydl outlined the proposed childcare center's location, zoning compliance, and operational conditions. He explained that the proposed home-based daycare would be located at 919 Morning Glory Turn in Twin Lakes. He said that the facility would meet zoning ordinance criteria and that the applicant must still complete state licensing requirements. He explained that the location has a large driveway with off-road parking and is well-screened by trees from neighboring homes. The site is in an A1 zoning district and consistent with the comprehensive plan's support for small businesses. Mr. Frydl noted specific conditions for the permit which state that the business can serve no more than twelve children under thirteen and can operate between 6am and 7pm, Monday through Saturday and lastly, that the home must be the principal residence of the operator. He highlighted that the Health Department approved the drain field, and the location has good visibility for traffic safety. The Planning Commission recommended approval 5-0.

The public hearing was opened and closed with no speakers.

The Board agreed that this request was good for the community and provides a needed service. Ms. Thompkins said that her neighbors had all signed a document in support of the request.

RE: REQUEST FROM GREENE COMMONS TO BUILD RESTROOM FACILITIES

Mr. Roy Dye provided a detailed chronology of the Greene Commons project, highlighting key milestones from 2016 to present. He explained that the project began with a DHCD grant, with \$370,000 earmarked for pavilion and stage construction. When initial funds ran short, bathroom facilities were postponed. He outlined the project's progression, including the creation of a nonprofit organization, the pavilion's completion in 2020, and donation of the complex to the county in 2022. Mr. Dye noted the Tourism Council's recommendation to allocate funds and mentioned a \$37,000 Perry Foundation matching grant with two key conditions: receiving the match by March and providing a three-party Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the county, Greene Commons group, and the town. He requested three specific actions from the board which included reaffirming previous approval for bathroom facility construction, approving the allocation of \$50,000 in tourism funds and signing the proposed MOU. Mr. Dye emphasized that no county taxpayer funds would be used and expressed confidence in the community's ability to potentially raise additional funds if needed.

Mr. Bill Henry, a member of the Greene Commons group board and Farmers Market Committee, presented the restroom facilities proposal. He emphasized that while the project initially seems focused on the farmers market, it aims to increase the facility's overall usability and attract more community events. Mr. Henry highlighted current challenges, such as vendors having to leave their booths to use restrooms in the county building and the inconvenience for people with mobility issues. He requested the same items be approved by the board as Mr. Dye did. The proposed facility would include three handicapped-accessible stalls and a storage room for chairs and tables. Mr. Henry noted they have a \$40,000 private donation and a preliminary contractor quote of \$142,000. He stressed that the funds would come from tourism occupancy tax, not county taxpayer money, and would support the county's goal of attracting visitors and hosting community events. Mr. Henry also mentioned potential future fundraising if additional money is needed and expressed hope that the restrooms would make the Greene Commons a more attractive venue for community gatherings.

Mr. McGuigan asked about the additional funds needed for the project. Mr. Henry said that they had received a \$40,000 donation from a private party. The Board discussed the need to have a MOU that would decide things like maintenance and cleaning of the facility. It was the consensus of the Board that a draft MOU and verification of availability of the funds requested be provided at the next meeting for approval.

RE: BOARD LIAISON REPORTS

Mr. Lamb said that he attended the Culpeper Soil and Water meeting, and they discussed the grant funding for septic tanks.

RE: COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

Ms. Schafrik provided a comprehensive overview of recent and upcoming community initiatives. She highlighted successful community events like Sunsets on Main and the July 4th celebration, emphasizing their role in building community spirit and bringing residents together. Ms. Schafrik also shared several administrative improvements, including a new web page for county purchasing, an online permit submission tool for planning and zoning, and updated payment collection procedures for water and sewer bills. She promoted upcoming community services like the mobile DMV and a senior center presentation on fraud prevention.

RE: OTHER ITEMS FROM THE BOARD

Mr. McGuigan raised concerns about Senate Bill 9474, which affects subdivision ordinances. He noted that the bill changes the approval process for plot plans, removing authority from the planning commission and governing body and assigning it to a designated agent. While the planning commission can still act as this agent, the county will likely need to revise its ordinances to define the new process. Mr. Catalano expanded on Mr. McGuigan's point, expressing broader concern about the ongoing erosion of local control. He highlighted the increasing trend of state-level interventions that limit local governments' ability to regulate property issues. Mr. Catalano cited examples like solar panel and winery developments, where state-guaranteed rights can create conflicting land uses without local input. He characterized this as a troubling trend and suggested that the only recourse is to lobby and raise awareness about these issues, though he acknowledged it would be a challenging process.

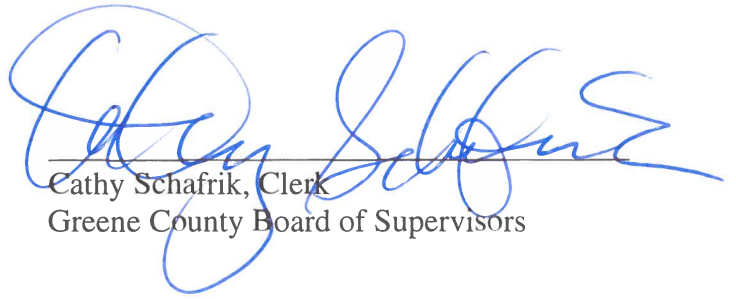

AN ORDINANCE (O-2025-004) TO AMEND ARTICLE 22, "DEFINITIONS," OF THE GREENE COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE, BY REVISING THE DEFINITION OF *INDOOR RECREATION FACILITIES* AND ADDING A NEW DEFINITION FOR *HEALTH AND FITNESS CENTERS*. *HEALTH AND FITNESS CENTERS* ARE PROPOSED TO BE ADDED AS A BY-RIGHT USE IN THE FOLLOWING ZONING DISTRICTS: ARTICLE 7 (PUD), ARTICLE 8 (B-1 BUSINESS), ARTICLE 10A (TFRD), ARTICLE 11 (M-1 INDUSTRIAL), AND ARTICLE 12 (M-2 INDUSTRIAL). (OR25-003)

WHEREAS, Sections 15.2-1427 and 15.2-1433 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as may be amended from time to time, enable a local governing body to adopt, amend and codify ordinances or portions thereof; and

WHEREAS, Sections 15.2-2280, 15.2-2285, and 15.2-2286 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, enables a local governing body to adopt and amend zoning ordinances; and

WHEREAS, it is desired to amend the Greene County Zoning Ordinance, Article 22 Definitions and add a new Article 10A Technology/Flex Research and Development; and

WHEREAS, this amendment of the Greene County Zoning Ordinance is required to serve the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, and good zoning practice pursuant to Section 15.2-2286(A)(7) of the Code of Virginia, as amended; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2025 the Greene County Planning Commission held public hearings on this matter, and all of those who spoke on this topic were heard; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2025, the Greene County Planning Commission voted (5-0) to recommend to the Board of Supervisors approval of the request to amend the Greene County Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Board of Supervisors caused to be published a notice of public hearing on this matter in The Piedmont Journal Recorder on June 24, 2025 and July 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the full text of this amendment was available for public inspection in the Greene County Administration Building, Room 226, 40 Celt Road, Stanardsville, Virginia 22973.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF GREENE that the adoption of the modifications of Article 22, "Definitions," of the Greene County Zoning Ordinance by revising the definition of *Indoor Recreation Facilities* and adding a new definition for *Health and Fitness Centers*. *Health and Fitness Centers* are proposed to be added as a by-right use in the following zoning districts: Article 7 (PUD), Article 8 (B-1 Business), Article 10A (TFRD), Article 11 (M-1 Industrial), and Article 12 (M-2 Industrial). (OR25-003) are approved as presented:

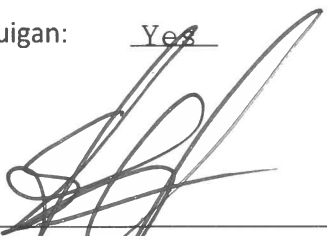

AN ORDINANCE (O-2025-006) TO GRANT A SPECIAL USE PERMIT TO DASIA TOMKINS FOR A CHILD CARE CENTER, AS REQUIRED THROUGH ARTICLES 4-1-2.12 AND 22 OF THE GREENE COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE. THE PARCEL IDENTIFIED AS TMP# 49A-3-T-32, LOCATED AT 919 MORNING GLORY TURN, IS ZONED A-1 (AGRICULTURAL), APPROXIMATELY 0.73 OF AN ACRE. THE GREENE COUNTY FUTURE LAND USE MAP DESIGNATES IT AS A "RURAL AREA" (SUP25-002).

WHEREAS, §15.2-1427 and §15.2-1433 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as may be amended from time to time, enable a local governing body to adopt, amend, and codify ordinances or portions thereof; and

WHEREAS, §15.2-2280, §15.2-2285, and §15.2-2286 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, enables a local governing body to adopt and amend zoning ordinances; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2025, the Greene County Planning Commission held a public hearing on this matter, and all of those who spoke on this topic were heard; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2025, the Greene County Planning Commission voted 5-0 to recommend the approval with conditions of the request to grant the Special Use Permit (SUP); and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Board of Supervisors caused to be published a notice of public hearing on this matter in The Piedmont Journal Recorder on June 24, 2025, and July 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the complete application was available for public inspection in the Greene County Administration Building, Room 226, 40 Celt Road, Stanardsville, Virginia 22973; and

WHEREAS, on April 8, 2025 the Greene County Board of Supervisors held a public hearing on this matter, and all of those who spoke on this topic were heard.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Greene County Board of Supervisors, in accordance with Article 16-2 of the Greene County Zoning Ordinance, public necessity, convenience, general welfare, and good zoning practice, that the SUP request is hereby approved with the following conditions:

- 1) The childcare center shall comply with all local, state, and federal regulations applicable to early childhood care.
- 2) The facility shall serve no more than 12 children under 13 years old, excluding the provider's children.
- 3) Hours of operation are limited to between the hours of 6:00 AM-7:00 PM.
- 4) The childcare center shall only operate Monday-Saturday.
- 5) The home shall be the principal residence of the childcare center operator.

THOUSAND EIGHTY-TWO DOLLARS IN OPIOID
ABATEMENT FUNDS FOR EMS EQUIPMENT GRANT
MATCH AND PURCHASE OF ACCESSORIES**

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia and localities have entered into several settlements regarding the opioid crisis from drug manufacturers and pharmacies; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene received opioid abatement funds and the funds will be used for equipment that assists the Greene County Emergency Medical Services in responding to opioid-related calls; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene intends to purchase two Lifepak 35 devices for the Greene County Emergency Medical Services department and the required accessories for the monitors; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene received a grant from the Office of Emergency Medical Services through the Rescue Squad Assistance Fund for the purchases totaling fifty-one thousand four hundred dollars (\$51,400.00) for emergency medical services equipment that requires a 50-percent match from the County; and

WHEREAS, the match required for the grant is fifty-one thousand four hundred dollars (\$51,400.00); and

WHEREAS, the grant does not include the cost of the necessary accessories for either of the two Lifepaks, totaling twenty-five thousand six hundred and eighty-two dollars (\$25,682.00); and

WHEREAS, the funds in the amount of seventy-seven thousand eighty-two dollars (\$77,082.00) may be appropriated from opioid settlement funds to purchase the equipment in the 2025-2026 budget of the County of Greene, Virginia.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Greene, Virginia that seventy-seven thousand eighty-two dollars (\$77,082.00) in opioid settlement funds be appropriated to the 2025-2026 budget of the County of Greene, Virginia.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Administrator of the County of Greene, Virginia is authorized to make the appropriate accounting adjustments in the budget to do all things necessary to give this resolution effect.

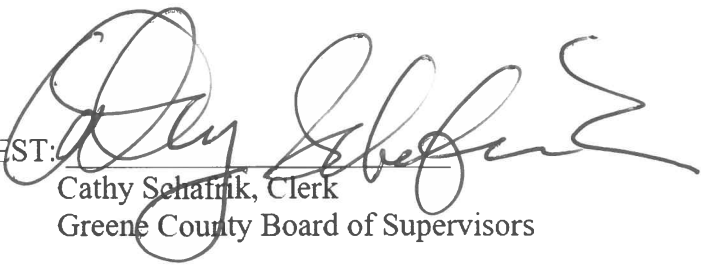

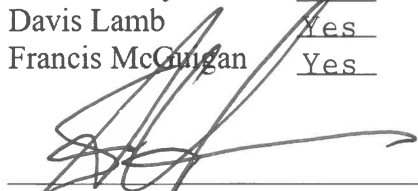

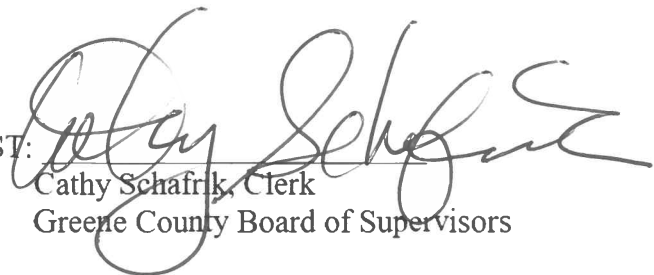
