RE: MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

Ms. Hope Barber thanked the Board for their hard work and specifically praised Francis McGuigan for his efforts in public education and informing the public.

Mr. Ken Copeland expressed concerns about the proposed social media policy, arguing that it could limit public comment and infringe on First Amendment rights. He felt the policy was overly broad and vague and could result in a chilling effect on public comment.

Ms. Jennifer Lewis-Fowler raised concerns about the safety of the ramp at the building, noting it is not ADA compliant and suggesting some inexpensive fixes like additional handrails and lighting. She also expressed concerns about the draft social media policy, stating that it could limit county staff and board members' First Amendment rights on their personal social media accounts.

Ms. Lisa Smith discussed issues with a mobile home park, stating that the residents are facing uncertainty about where they will go when they receive eviction notices. She said the county should hold the developer, Milestone, accountable for not fulfilling their promised obligations to the residents. She also raised concerns about trespassing and safety issues at the construction site for the new development. Mr. McGuigan stated that since the county is being criticized for not having enough low-income or moderate-income housing, the county should try to follow any precedents and enforce the obligations Milestone made to the mobile home park residents. Mr. Catalano agreed, saying the county should get a report from staff on the facts of the situation and send someone to understand why the construction site is not secure, as someone could get hurt.

Mr. Bill Zutt briefly thanked Dr. McGuigan for his input this year. He also stated that Ms. Schafrik had assured him that the draft social media policy resolution is not an attempt to stifle or curtail public dissent or comment, and he hopes the board will take a very close look at the resolution before passing it.

RE: PROCLAMATION OF RECOGNITION FOR THE WOMAN'S CLUB OF GREENE

Ms. Durrer read the proclamation of recognition for the Woman's Club of Greene and thanked them for their dedication and work for our county over the last fifty years. (See Attachment "A")

RE: FY 2025 AUDIT

Mr. Matt McLearn of Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates, presented the results of the Fiscal Year 2024 audit. McLearn reviewed the "letter to those charged with governance" which is a standard communication required by auditing standards. This letter highlighted a few key points such as the responsibilities of the auditor versus management in the audit process, the use of accounting estimates in the financial statements, such as depreciation and pension/OPEB liabilities and difficulties encountered during the audit, of which there were none reported. He went over the corrected and uncorrected audit adjustments and shared that all proposed adjustments were included in the final report. Regarding the financial statements themselves, Mr.

McLearan said that the auditor's report on page 6 provided an unmodified or "clean" opinion, indicating the financial statements were presented fairly. On page 22, the general fund balance was approximately \$31.3 million, with \$18.8 million in unassigned fund balance. The unassigned fund balance represented about 31% of the general fund budgeted expenditures, which is above the 15-25% range typically recommended by bond rating agencies. He said that the water and sewer net position was \$37.4 million on page 25. Mr. McLearan also reviewed reports on internal controls and compliance with federal grant requirements, which had no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Mr. McLearan also answered detailed questions from Mr. McGuigan about reconciling the different fund balance and revenue/expenditure numbers presented on different financial statements, due to the use of different bases of accounting such as budgetary vs. full accrual.

The Board thanked Mr. McLearan for his presentation.

RE: FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT AND CONFLICT OF INTEREST ACT OVERVIEW

Ms. Kemp provided an overview of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) and the Conflict of Interest Act. She shared that the purpose of FOIA is to give the public access to public records and ensure meetings are open to the public. She explained that FOIA requests can be made verbally or in writing, and the county has specific timelines to respond. All records in the county's possession are subject to FOIA, including emails and text messages, even on personal accounts. There are over 130 exceptions where records can be withheld, such as for public safety, education, and health records. Violations of FOIA can result in civil penalties against the county and individual board members.

Ms. Kemp also spoke about the Conflict of Interest Act. She said that Board members must be aware of and disclose any personal interests in county transactions or contracts. Personal interest is narrowly defined, such as ownership in a business that could benefit from certain county business transactions. She said that immediate family members such as a spouse or dependents are also covered under the act. If a conflict exists, the board members must recuse themselves from discussions and voting. Board members must also file annual disclosure forms listing their financial interests. She said that violations can result in misdemeanor or felony charges. Ms. Kemp emphasized the importance of board members consulting with her or the County Administrator if they have any questions or concerns about potential conflicts of interest.

RE: SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

Ms. Kemp shared a draft social media policy with the Board. She said the draft policy was intended as a first attempt to establish guidelines and rules around content on county social media sites. Ms. Kemp acknowledged the policy as presented may be overly broad and vague and could invite overreach and abuse if applied to the public. She suggested the policy could be focused more narrowly on regulating county staff's use of official county social media accounts, rather than trying to restrict personal social media use by board members. Ms. Kemp offered to revise the policy and bring it back as part of an update to the county's personnel policies, rather than having

it apply directly to the board members. There was discussion about the need to balance protecting the county's interests on official channels while preserving board members' First Amendment rights on their personal social media accounts. The overall consensus of the Board was that a more targeted staff-focused policy may be appropriate, while the Board could potentially address their own social media use through the bylaws if desired.

RE: RADIO PROJECT UPDATE

Ms. Meador provided an update on the new public safety radio system that went live the previous week. She stated that the new system is a significant improvement over the old system, with much better coverage and reliability. The mobile radio coverage is now running at 98-99%, and portable coverage is around 95-96%, compared to only 65% and 35% respectively with the old system. Ms. Meador said the new system is "100% enhancing public safety in Greene County" and helping the Sheriff, fire chiefs, and EMS sleep better at night, as the old system was a constant concern about when it would fail.

Sheriff Smith echoed Ms. Meador's comments, noting that with the old system he could only receive on his portable radio but couldn't transmit, and now deputies can walk out of their houses and communicate clearly.

Ms. Meador and Sheriff Smith expressed deep gratitude to the Board for their support in funding and seeing this project through, despite the many challenges over the years. Ms. Meador highlighted the contributions of many county staff, vendors, and partners who were instrumental in getting the new system implemented successfully.

RE: BYLAWS FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2025

The Board had an extensive discussion regarding potential changes to the bylaws. Mr. McGuigan emphasized the importance of protecting the rights of Greene County residents, especially freedom of speech, and the need for better notification and audio-visual policies for meetings. Mr. McGuigan made a motion, which was seconded by Davis Lamb, to say that paragraph six, item number three, “no less than seven days” is changed to “no less than two business days prior to the first posting of the board agenda, and no less than one business day to respond to any additions to the agenda.”

There was discussion about the practicality of these changes, with concerns raised about staff time and the ability to accommodate last-minute additions to the agenda. Ms. Schafrik explained the current agenda process and why staff sometimes must add items close to the meeting date.

Mr. Catalano clarified Mr. McGuigan’s comments saying that what is currently stated in the bylaws regarding the public’s timeline to submit an AV presentation is actually impossible to achieve. He suggested that the Board take a vote on the original motion on the floor and then revise the motion to clarify the timeline.

Ms. Schafrik noted there were also vacancies on the Board of Zoning Appeals and the Ruckersville Advisory Committee, as well as other vacancies that need to be filled.

RE: BOARD LIAISON REPORTS

Mr. Lamb said that he attended the Culpeper Soil and Water meeting, and Ms. Durrer said that she attended the Jail Board meeting.

RE: COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR’S UPDATE

Ms. Schafrik shared a presentation of the 2024 Year in Review that highlighted key accomplishments and initiatives from the previous year. She shared various community engagement efforts, such as the Justin Tooley Memorial Power Lifting Challenge. She also highlighted various infrastructure improvements, including the courthouse renovations, transfer station updates, new fitness trails at the park, and the sale of the unused trailers behind the Courthouse. Ms. Schafrik shared agency innovations and awards, such as the Water Treatment Plant receiving a bronze award and the Sheriff’s Office achieving its third accreditation. Ms. Schafrik also mentioned the EMS passing their inspection as a model agency, and the Standardsville Volunteer Fire Department passing their first responder inspection. She emphasized the need for volunteers for various boards and committees, including the Board of Equalization, Board of Zoning Appeals, Ruckersville Advisory Committee, and Tourism Council.

RE: OTHER ITEMS FROM THE BOARD

Mr. McGuigan mentioned that a constituent had asked if the county has a policy on people having to shovel their sidewalks, as the state allows counties to enact such policies. Ms. Schafrik responded that the county does not have a policy on shoveling sidewalks, but the town of Standardsville does have such a policy that requires landowners to clear their sidewalks. She explained that when the recent snowstorm hit, she and several other volunteers had gone out to help clear the town of Standardsville, as some residents needed assistance. The consensus from the Board was that a county-wide policy on shoveling sidewalks is not applicable at the moment, since the walkability issues are more concentrated within the town limits.

Mr. McGuigan raised a question about this building on the corner of Route 609 and Route 29, which was built as an agricultural building but now may be used as a farmers' market. McGuigan was concerned that the building was constructed under an agricultural exemption, and now the owners may try to label it as agritourism to avoid any further review or oversight by the county. Ms. Schafrik acknowledged McGuigan's concerns and said she would need to research the specifics of this case further to provide a complete answer. She said that she would update the Board on the status of this building, the applicable ordinance requirements, and how the county is handling the change in use from the original agricultural purpose.

Mr. McGuigan said that, at a previous meeting, the Board had discussed the idea of some kind of firefighter appreciation initiative and asked if there had been any action on it. Mr. Catalano responded that the consensus of the Board was to push this initiative into the budget discussions, which were coming up in about a month. Ms. Schafrik confirmed that the Board had not voted on anything specific regarding firefighter appreciation, but the plan was to consider it further during the upcoming budget process.

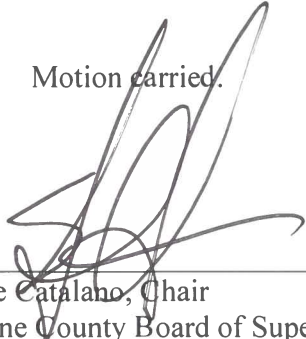
Mr. McGuigan stated that the audit showed the county had \$6.9 million in excess funds after removing the debt service transfer to the water and sewer fund and, based on this, made a motion to provide a \$200 personal property tax credit to each Greene County family, which he estimated would cost around \$1.6 million. Ms. Kemp and others noted that the Board's bylaws preclude the Board from voting on items under Other Matters from the Board and also that doing this type of direct rebate to taxpayers would require a separate ordinance. Mr. Catalano suggested it would be better to consider this type of taxpayer relief as part of the upcoming budget process when the Board can look at the full financial picture and determine the best approach, rather than making a standalone decision now. The other members agreed.

WHEREAS, the Woman's Club of Greene County is a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs of Virginia, established in 1910; and

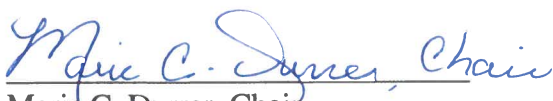

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Resident Engineer for the Virginia Department of Transportation.

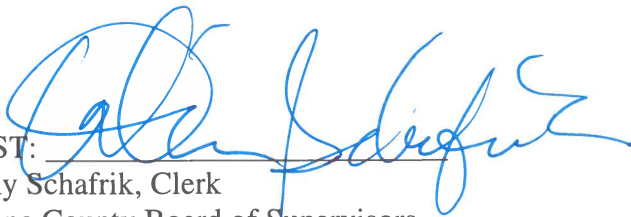

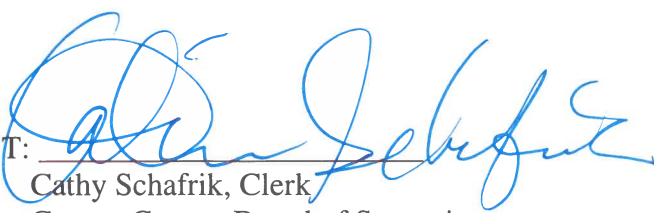

**RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE SEVENTY-EIGHT
THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-TWO
DOLLARS IN OPIOID ABATEMENT FUNDS
FOR EMS EQUIPMENT MATCH**

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Virginia and localities have entered into several settlements regarding the opioid crisis from drug manufacturers and pharmacies; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene received opioid abatement funds and the funds will be used for equipment that assists the Greene County Emergency Medical Services in responding to opioid-related calls; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene intends to purchase one LUCAS 3 device and three Lifepak 35 devices for the Greene County Emergency Medical Services department; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene received a grant from the Office of Emergency Medical Services through the Rescue Squad Assistance Fund for the purchases totaling seventy-eight thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$78,532.00) for emergency medical services equipment that requires a 50-percent match from the County; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene has received one hundred fifty-five thousand, two hundred and thirty-six dollars and six cents in direct disbursements (\$155,236.06) through the opioid settlements; and

WHEREAS, the County of Greene has not allocated any of the opioid settlement funding; and

WHEREAS, the match required for the grant is seventy-eight thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$78,532.00); and

WHEREAS, the funds in the amount of seventy-eight thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$78,532.00) may be appropriated from opioid settlement funds to purchase the equipment in the 2024-2025 budget of the County of Greene, Virginia.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Greene, Virginia that seventy-eight thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$78,532.00) in opioid settlement funds be appropriated to the 2024-2025 budget of the County of Greene, Virginia.

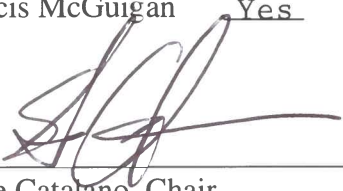

**RESOLUTION FOR THE DECLARATION

2. As a result of this peril, the proclamation of the existence of an emergency is necessary to permit the full powers of government to deal effectively with this condition of peril as of 1300 hours on the 5th day of January, 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Greene, Virginia, that a local emergency now exists throughout the County of Greene; and

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that during the existence of said emergency, the powers, functions and duties of the Director of Emergency Management and the Emergency Management organization and functions of the County of Greene shall be those prescribed by state law and the ordinances, resolutions, and approved plans of the County of Greene to mitigate the effects of said emergency.

To carry out the effect of this resolution, a sum of money, not to exceed \$5,000, is hereby appropriated from the county's unappropriated fund balance to cover the reasonable operational cost of Emergency Management pending further report to this Board and such additional appropriations as shall be deemed necessary to cover the expected scope of this emergency.

Affirmed and adopted this 14th day of January, 2025 due to the emergency conditions caused by the Winter Storm Blair.

WHEREAS, because of this peril, a declaration of the existence of an emergency was necessary to permit the full powers of government to deal effectively with this condition of peril; and,

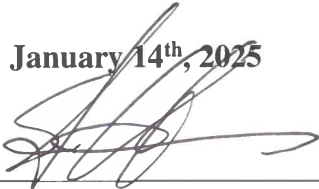

WHEREAS, on January 14th, 2025 the Board of Supervisors met and confirmed by resolution that a Local Emergency did exist, and,

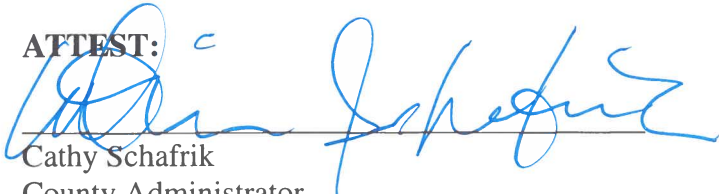
WHEREAS, pursuant to the declaration of a local emergency, the County's Emergency Operations Plan was activated;

AMENDMENT TO MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Amendment to Memorandum of Understanding (“Amendment”) entered into as of December 19, 2024, by and between the VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT (“DHCD”) and CONNECT HOLDING II LLC d/b/a Brightspeed, a Delaware limited liability company (“ISP”) (ISP and DHCD are referred to herein individually a “Party” and collectively “Parties”) provides as follows:

RECITALS:

- A. The Parties entered into a certain Memorandum of Understanding dated as of March 15, 2023 (“Memorandum of Understanding”) in connection with the ISP’s broadband deployment work in the Virginia Counties of Campbell, Greene and Madison (“Localities”) with funding through the Federal Communication Commission’s Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (“RDOF”).
- B. The Memorandum of Understanding, among other things, obligated the ISP to accelerate its planned broadband construction project funded under RDOF prior to the Federal Communications Commission (“FCC”) required project completion date (“the RDOF Funded Areas”).
- C. The ISP and Central Virginia Services, Inc. submitted an application to the FCC titled Joint Domestic 214 Application for Consent to Assign Rural Digital Opportunity Fund Support and Related Buildout and Service Obligation (“FCC 214 Application”) that was approved on December 18, 2024 in WC Docket No. 24-311 and therefore, the RDOF obligations for Census Block Group No. 511139302003 (“Census Block”) in the County of Madison, Virginia are now the obligation of Central Virginia Services, Inc.
- D. The ISP and DHCD wish to amend the Memorandum of Understanding to remove the obligation to accelerate the RDOF build in the above referenced Census Block group in the County of Madison, as that obligation has been transferred to Central Virginia Services, Inc.
- E. The RDOF acceleration timelines for the RDOF Funded Areas in Campbell and Greene Counties have not been completed as of the required acceleration date of December 15, 2024. Although ISP sought an extension, that extension was not granted.
- F. The ISP and DHCD wish to terminate the Memorandum of Understanding. ISP agreed in the Memorandum of Understanding, among other things, that DHCD may terminate the Memorandum of Understanding and deny ISP’s challenge referred to in the Memorandum of Understanding (“Challenge”) pursuant to the terms of Section 8 of the Memorandum of Understanding, although ISP continues to have a funded federal enforceable RDOF commitment in RDOF Funded Areas in Campbell and Greene Counties.
- G. The ISP and DHCD desire to enter into this Amendment to achieve the purposes set forth above.

AGREEMENT:

NOW THEREFORE, in good and sufficient consideration of the foregoing recitals and the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, and such other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

1. The ISP agrees and DHCD acknowledges that the ISP's RDOF obligations in Madison County as referenced in recital C above have been transferred and therefore assumed by and assigned to Central Virginia Services, Inc., mooted any RDOF acceleration of the ISP in the County of Madison, Virginia.
2. As set forth in the Memorandum of Understanding, and without limitation, in the event of and at the time of termination, DHCD may deny the Challenge to VATI funding in the RDOF Funded Areas and DHCD hereby denies the Challenge. DHCD will release any Virginia Telecommunication Initiative funds made the subject of the Challenge to the Localities.
3. The ISP and DHCD agree to terminate the Memorandum of Understanding, without prejudice to the ISP's rights to perform broadband deployment construction work funded by RDOF in the Counties of Campbell, Virginia and Greene, Virginia.
4. This Amendment is made, and is intended to be performed, in the Commonwealth of Virginia and shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Exclusive Jurisdiction and venue for any litigation arising out of or involving this Amendment shall lie in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond, Virginia and such litigation shall be brought only in such court.
5. If any provision of this Amendment is determined to be unenforceable, invalid or illegal, then the enforceability, validity and legality of the remaining provisions will not in any way be affected or impaired, and such provision will be deemed to be restated to reflect the original intentions of the parties as nearly as possible in accordance with applicable law.
6. ISP waives its rights to a jury trial.
7. This Amendment shall not create any rights in third-parties or otherwise constitute a third-party beneficiary contract.
8. It is agreed by all Parties hereto that the terms of this Amendment are contractual and not a mere recital and that the recitals set forth above are true and accurate.
9. All Parties hereto and those signing on their behalf represent and warrant that they possess the full and complete authority to covenant and release as herein provided and further represent and warrant that they have the full and complete authority to execute the releases herein contained. All parties hereto represent and warrant that they have not assigned any of their respective claims hereby released.
10. The Parties hereto represent and state that they have carefully read the foregoing Amendment and know the contents thereof and sign the same as their own free act and deed after having the advice of their respective independent legal counsel.
11. This Amendment reflects the entire agreement by and between the parties related to the Challenge and no statements, promises or inducements made by any of the parties related to the Challenge which are not contained herein, shall be valid and binding.
12. The captions and section headings contained herein are for convenience only and shall not be used in construing or enforcing any of the provisions of this Amendment. All personal

pronouns used herein, whether used in the masculine, feminine or neuter gender, shall include all other genders. The singular shall include the plural and vice versa unless the context specifically requires otherwise.

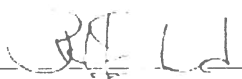
